ach year, just before Historic Zoar Village settles in for a brief winter's nap, they host a weekend so popular it has attracted visitors for years. It's called Christmas in Zoar, and it is as charming and beautiful a holiday event as you will find anywhere.

of Canton, Historic Zoar Village was settled in 1817 by German immigrants seeking religious freedom from the state-sponsored church Württemberg. After struggling to

banded together to form a communal society that became one of the longest lasting such settlements in the United States, spanning nearly 80 years.

Ironically, the Society of Separatists (as the Zoar settlers called themselves) did not originally celebrate Christmas Located just about 10 miles south or any other holiday. Their particular brand of religion eschewed such formal religious celebrations and rites. But anecdotal history tells the tale of a frosty Christmas morning when the Separatists were about to be called

survive the first two years, the residents to work, as they were every day, with the blare of a ceramic horn. Just as the trustee wrapped his lips around the mouthpiece and blew, the horn cracked and broke. The Separatists took this as a sign that they should no longer work on Christmas Day.

The cracked ceramic horn is on display, along with many other Zoar artifacts, in the Number One House, one of several museums that can be toured during Christmas in Zoar as part of the festival ticket.

Because of Christmas in Zoar, RAVE Reviews online ranks Historic Zoar Village among the 25 most festive Christmas towns in the nation, placing Zoar in the esteemed company of cities like Williamsburg, Virginia; New York City, New York; and Aspen, Colorado.

Among the reasons for that ranking, the web site mentions the picturesque 19th century-era decorations, horsedrawn wagon rides through the village, tours of private homes decorated for the holidays, and the candlelight church service at the original Zoar Meeting House, now a United Church REPEAT VISITORS of Christ.

Kelsey Snyder, Christmas in Zoar Committee Co-Chair, offers additional insight into the beloved annual event. "The 2019 celebration will build upon the festival's most treasured German and period traditions while trending toward the next generation of the event." For instance, this year musical entertainment, juried folk art and crafts, German-inspired food and other activities will spread holiday cheer more thoroughly throughout the entire village. A new photo station will allow visitors to take photos in front of a special Zoar backdrop. And extended hours on Saturday until 7 pm will give visitors time to shop for gifts and stroll through the village in the evening amidst the glow of holiday lights.

"Pine Cone Gift Shop from Canton will return this year to decorate the Bimeler House," says Snyder. "They did such an amazing job with this last year that we are bringing them back to see what they will inspire us with this year."

VISITS WITH TRADITIONAL AND GERMAN SANTAS

Christmas in Zoar is a delight for children as they can visit with the traditional American Santa Claus and meet the characters Belsnickel and Kristkind. Belsnickel is a German, furclad gift bringer who encouraged children to memorize Bible verses. Kristkind (or Christkind) is a spritelike child often depicted with blond hair and angelic wings that also brings gifts to children. Children attending Christmas in Zoar can meet these characters and partake in other kids' activities throughout the village.

Each year, Christmas in Zoar attracts visitors who have been attending the event for years. They come to make sure they get their collectible, handmade and dated Zoar Christmas ornament and Zoar Christmas cards from the Zoar Store. They also come to find just the right handmade gifts from the folk art and craft vendors set up throughout the village. And they return to make new memories with friends and family in the enchanting environment.

Historic Zoar Village Site Director Tammi Shrum says that Zoar is always a special place, "but the holiday season seems to really bring out the magic of the village as everyone here participates in spreading holiday cheer."

HOURS AND TICKET INFORMATION

Christmas in Zoar hours are Saturday, December 7 from 11 am to 7 pm and Sunday, December 8 from noon to 4 pm. Admission is \$10 for adults and free for kids under age 12. As you walk through the grocery store and pass aisle upon aisle of food you might recall past conversations where those foods came up. 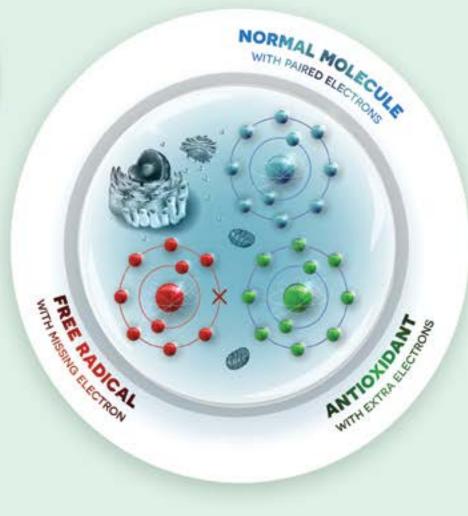

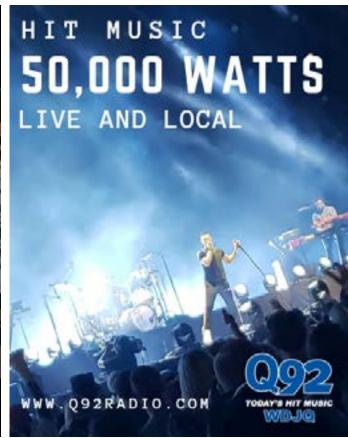

When you think of hormones, things such as mood swings, weight gain, puberty, menopause, or stress might things your body does. come to mind. These are all very real body. Hormones are a necessary part of them you wouldn't survive.

Around 50 different hormones are working in your body to keep it functioning as it should. In fact, and restores balance afterward. they control most of your body's major systems, telling them what to rise in your body? Any type of stress! do and when. At least, until those hormones become imbalanced. One hormone in particular, cortisol, can be easily disrupted and that can have a tremendous impact on the way that your gut health works, or doesn't work.

Think of cortisol as nature's builtin alarm system. It's your body's main stress response hormone. It works with certain parts of your brain to control your mood, motivation, and fear. The adrenal glands – those triangle-shaped organs at the top of your kidneys -

Ah, the great topic of hormones. for helping fuel your body's "fight-orflight" instinct in a crisis, but it also plays an important role in a number of

For example, it manages how effects of hormones working in the your body uses carbohydrates, fats, and proteins; keeps inflammation your body's total functioning. Without down; regulates your blood pressure; increases your blood sugar (glucose); controls your sleep/wake cycle; and boosts energy so you can handle stress

> So, what can make cortisol levels And stress in the body can be presented in multiple ways. It can be mental or emotional distress; it can be presented as musculoskeletal pain; dietary stress has an impact on cortisol levels; and even exercise can cause the stress response system to activate, increasing cortisol levels.

If you believe you might have elevated levels of cortisol, you will want to get tested. If you go for testing make sure that you have multiple readings throughout the day, since testing only make cortisol. Cortisol is best known in the morning can provide a false

positive reading. Because cortisol levels change throughout the day, the timing of a cortisol test is important. A cortisol blood test is usually done twice a day – once in the morning when cortisol levels are at their highest, and again around 4 pm, when levels are much lower.

Consistently elevated cortisol levels can have major impacts on the body. If cortisol levels never decrease in the evening as they should, this is an indicator of some type of regular stress on the body. When this happens, one area it can affect is your gut health. An increase in cortisol suppresses a substance called Secretory Immunoglobulin A (or SIgA for short). Since SIg A produces mucosal antibodies and is an index of immunity, it helps protect the lining of the small intestine.

When SIgA is suppressed by stress, even briefly, it can result in a condition known as Leaky Gut. Leaky Gut can be thought of as increased "intestinal permeability." This means the lining of the small intestine becomes damaged, causing undigested food particles, toxic waste products and bacteria to "leak" through the intestines and flood the blood stream. When this happens, either important nutrients are not absorbed by the body or the body reacts to the toxic substances in the bloodstream.

For many of you who struggle with gut distress, it is like no other stress, as it is always present, 24 hours a

day and 7 days a week. This is mainly because, according to the Harvard Medical School Health Blog, "There is emerging evidence that the standard American diet, which is low in fiber and high in sugar and saturated fats, may initiate this process. Heavy alcohol use and stress also seem to disrupt this

The main things that can cause gastrointestinal distress include:

- 1. Alcohol Increases gut permeability, as well as decreases blood sugar and increases cortisol in the middle of the night, resulting in poor sleep and thus more stress.
- 2. Certain Medications Antibiotics, hormonal medications (such as birth control), and acid suppressors (PPIs or heartburn medications).
- **3. Food –** Poor diet, as well as those with sensitivities/allergies to certain foods.
- **4. Exercise** Blood is shunted away from the digestive system during exercise, resulting in GI distress. Usually this occurs more often with ultra-endurance type athletes, but it also can occur with short-term, high intensity style workouts as it depends on the individual; so if you're under a lot of stress already, less is more. Consider a more relaxing type of exercise for the day or until your stress levels are reduced.

Consistently elevated cortisol levels can have major impacts on the body. If cortisol levels never decrease in the evening as they should, this is an indicator of some type of regular stress on the body.

Food allergies, as mentioned above, can also cause GI distress. If you believe you might be sensitive to certain foods, two good sources for food sensitivity testing are Vibrant Wellness and Cyrex Labs. You can also try an elimination diet for 30-60 days and reintroduce one of the top six allergens at a time to determine which foods may be causing GI distress. These include corn products, soy, eggs, legumes, dairy, and wheat.

All in all, remember that hormones, such as cortisol, are impacted by what you consume. If your body's stress response system is kicked into high gear because of the foods you're eating regularly, then it may be time to address what's on your plate and get those hormones back into balance. 🐟
