

Take some photos for lasting memories of the colors.

Part of the celebration will include a hiking challenge of 100 miles, Participants are encouraged to keep a log of their miles and to complete 100 miles by September 24, 2023, at which time they will be awarded with a commemorative item. Enthusiastic hikers will complete the task long before that.

A Centennial Party on September 24, 2023, will conclude the celebration. Twin Lakes Recreation Area will host the party with live music, as well as winery, brewery and food vendors. Admission to the event is free of charge.



In 1923, President Calvin Coolidge presented a gift to the people of the United States. He established the Allegheny National Forest in northwestern Pennsylvania with the mission of protecting the watershed of the Allegheny River while providing public lands for all to enjoy. One hundred years ago these lands needed care and protection. The land had been ravaged by wildfires and clearcutting.

Now in 2023, after 100 years of being a National Forest, the Allegheny National Forest is a 514,029-acre healthy hardwood forest, home to abundant wildlife, songbirds, wildflowers, American Bald Eagles, and osprey. In the northern section of the Forest, the Allegheny Reservoir offers boating, canoeing, and kayaking. Outdoor recreation sites include 14 campgrounds, cabins, and an extensive, four-season trail system for hiking, biking, mountain biking, ATV and snowmobiling in season.

To recognize and celebrate this 100-year milestone, multiple events are scheduled including the Centennial 100-mile Hiking Challenge, the ANF Centennial Geocache Trail, and the "100-year birthday" party for the ANF on September 24, at historic Twin Lakes.

Fall in the Forest and Nearby Kinzua Bridge State Park

During the fall, the tree-covered hillsides will change from green to a beautiful patchwork of color, sparkling yellow, brilliant orange and ruby red. Two premier sites for "leaf peeping" are the Kinzua Bridge State Park and the Allegheny National Forest.

Located within the Kinzua Bridge State Park is the Kinzua Sky Walk, "one of the top 10 most scenic skywalks in the world," according to The Culture Trip, U.K. The skywalk extends 624 feet into the Kinzua Gorge, at a height of 225 feet, and it features a partial glass floor at the end of the skywalk. The Kinzua Bridge Visitors Center has a series of interpretive displays explaining the history of the skywalk which is the reinvention of six of the historic towers of the Kinzua Viaduct left standing after the tornado of 2003.

There are three trails at the park, picnic tables, a food truck, and a train themed children's playground. The park is open from 8 am to 6 pm daily until the winter season. Admission and

parking are free. Fall color usually peaks in the first two weeks of October. The park is located at 296 Viaduct Road, Mt. Jewett, PA.

Bigger is better, and during the fall, the sheer size of the Allegheny National Forest makes it a premier destination for fall leaf peeping. Add the diversity of the species of trees, and you have an unbelievable world of fall color.

In the ANF, the Longhouse National Scenic Byway, a 27-mile loop, offers three developed overlooks: Rimrock, Kinzua Point, and Jakes Rocks. Rimrock also features a picnic area and a trail through massive rock formations to the edge of the Allegheny

Reservoir. Jakes Rocks offers a world class mountain biking trail near the developed overlook.

Centennial Hiking Challenge - Hike 100 Miles to Commemorate 100 Years

Hike 100 miles of the best and most beautiful trails in the Allegheny National Forest in honor of the ANF Centennial. Begin your challenge by downloading your trail log from www.fs.usda. gov/detail/allegheny/learning/history-culture. It is recommended to choose from the trails listed on the website, but you can choose others within the Allegheny National Forest making sure they add up to 100 miles.

As you are hiking, remember to mark the date, trail name, and miles hiked on your log. When you complete 100 miles, bring your hiking log to the Allegheny National Forest Visitors Bureau, 80 E. Corydon Street, Bradford, PA, or one of the ranger stations in Bradford, Marienville, or Warren, Pennsylvania, to receive commemorative items, while supplies last. The hiking challenge ends Sept. 24, 2023. The ranger station addresses can be located online at: www.fs.usda.gov/.../allegheny/about-forest/offices.

ANF Centennial Geocache Trail

The ANF Centennial Geocache Trail has been established to provide an opportunity to connect the American public to the outdoors, encourage families to explore the national forest, and to provide educational and recreational opportunities for the users of the trail. All caches are published on www.geocaching.com. Participants will need to register on geocaching.com to retrieve the coordinates and other location information. Then pick up a passport from the ranger stations or download at www.pennsoil.org. Follow the instructions to be eligible for an ANF Centennial Souvenir Token trackable on geocaching.com.

the Allegheny National Forest will be held at Twin Lakes Recreation Area. Twin Lakes is a historic site, built by the CCC boys of the Civil Conservation Core. A 1-mile hiking trail circles the lake and during the celebration there will be acoustical artisans playing at various locations along this trail. In addition, forest service employees will have interpretive stations where folks can see first-hand examples of the conservation and wildlife work now underway in the forest. The lake will be open for




Live music will be playing all day.



As one of the largest off-highway vehicle trail systems in the world, the Hatfield-McCoy Trails are open 365 days a year and offer something for every skill level. Cabwaylingo State Forest in Wayne County sits on nearly 8,300 acres of land. ATV, UTV, ORV (such as Jeeps) and dirt bike riders will find nearly 100 miles of new trails to explore, plenty of parking for trucks and trailers and a trailhead facility with trail permits and Hatfield-McCoy Trails merchandise for sale.





The Vietnam War was a divisive time in our Country. Over 58,000 servicemen and servicewomen lost their lives. On Veterans Day 1996, the Veterans Memorial Fund unveiled a traveling replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. Its purpose is to help heal.

"March 29, 2023 marked the 50th anniversary of the end of the Vietnam War," stated Caldwell Mayor Misty Wells. "Noble County has six names on the Memorial Wall that made the ultimate sacrifice. We are honored to be hosting the traveling Wall that Heals this very special year. We are planning an event to remember the soldiers that served and the families of those who never made it home."

The Wall That Heals, a three-quarter scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and a mobile Education Center, will be viewable in Caldwell, Ohio, October 19-22. The exhibit is free and open 24 hours a day. It pays tribute to over 3 million Americans who served in the U.S. Armed Forces in the Vietnam War. The wall itself includes the names of 58,281 men and women who died while serving in the war.

Like the original memorial, The Wall That Heals is erected in a chevron shape, and visitors are invited to do rubbings of individual service members' names. The names are listed in order of date of casualty and alphabetically on each day. Beginning at the center/apex, the names start on the East Wall, working their way out to the end of that wing, picking up again at the far end of the West Wall and working their way back into the center/apex. The first and last casualties are side by side at the apex of the Memorial.

The Wall That Heals allows the lives enshrined on the Memorial to exist one more time among family and friends. It provides veterans unable to travel and face The Wall a chance to find the courage to visit and begin the healing from the comfort of their community.

Mobile Education: The mobile education center features a timeline of "The War and The Wall." It provides



additional information about the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. It allows visitors to have a better understanding

Displays include Hometown Heroes photos of members on The Wall who list their home of record from the local area. The photos are part of The Wall of Faces, an effort to put a face to every name inscribed on The Wall.

In Memory Honor Roll - photos of local Vietnam veterans honored through VVMF's In Memory program, which honors veterans who returned home and later died.

A replica of the *In Memory* plaque that resides on the grounds of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial site in Washington, D.C., reads: "In Memory of

the men and women who served in the Vietnam War and later died as a result of their service. We honor and remember their sacrifice."

Items left behind - displays items representing those left at The Wall in remembrance of those on The Wall.

Since The Wall That Heals debuted, the exhibit has been on display in more than 700 U.S. communities. In 1999 it toured the Four Provinces of Ireland, and a visit to Canada in 2005. The Wall that Heals is a program of VVMF, the nonprofit organization that built the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., in 1982. It is the



only traveling exhibit affiliated with The Wall in Washington, D.C., and includes the largest Wall replica that travels the country. To see if The Wall That Heals is coming to a town near you, visit vvmf.org/The-Wall-That-Heals.





Raft the Gauley River

Fall is often characterized by cooler temperatures and bright foliage, but here in the New River Gorge, we identify this time of year with our worldfamous whitewater! For six weekends in September and October, the Gauley River has scheduled, controlled water releases from the Summersville Dam. This period of time is known as Gauley Season, West Virginia's fifth official season. Thrill seekers count down to this chance to raft 26 miles of the wildest rapids. Known as the "Beast of the East," the Gauley is consistently ranked one of the top five in the world to raft and in the top three to raft in the United States. The river consists of two distinct sections, the Upper and Lower Gauley.

The Lower Gauley is similar to the Lower New, with Class III-V rapids, but the Upper Gauley is truly a wild ride, featuring iconic Class V rapids – the "Big 5" – Insignificant, Pillow Rock, Lost Paddle, Iron Ring and Sweet's Falls.

These sections are typically each run separately as a full day trip, although you can raft the entire 26-mile Upper and Lower Gauley together as a Marathon Trip. The first release date for the 2023 season is on September 8, with the season ending on October 22. Gauley trips fill up quickly, so book yours now with one of our local outfitters.

Take in the Fall Foliage

With shades of red, orange and yellow leaves painting our already amazing landscape, autumn in the Gorge is an unforgettable experience. Combine the vibrant foliage with endless opportunities for outdoor adventure, and you've got a fall getaway that's truly one-of-a-kind.

Explore miles of winding trails on a scenic hike or mountain bike excursion. Long Point Trail, one of our favorite routes, offers an incredible angle of the New River Gorge Bridge, and the Arrowhead Trail System's diverse terrain is perfect for riders of all ages. Saddle up for a horseback ride through the forests or take a drive along Midland Trail to discover rushing waterfalls, wonderful overlooks and other local gems.

There are also plenty of more adventurous activities that will provide unique views of the seasonal landscape. For a stunning aerial view, scale our sandstone cliffs on a guided rock climbing trip or walk under the New River Gorge Bridge, 850 feet above the New River on a Bridge Walk tour.

Enjoy the Seasonal Events

Start your fall off with the Oak Leaf Festival from August 31 to September 3 in Oak Hill. This fun-filled weekend has entertainment for all ages, including live music, local vendors, a car show, a grand parade, fireworks and more. During the festival, shop a gigantic collection of books on the lawn of the Historic Lewis House.

Another event during Labor Day weekend is the West Virginia Craft Brewery Showcase. Head to ACE Adventure Resort on September 2 and go on a brew tour featuring

West Virginia's best craft breweries. Tickets include a commemorative glass, five tastings and live music on the deck all day long with The Company Stores, Matt Mullins & The Bringdowns, Long Point String Band and Whiskey & Wine.

End your September at the Montgomery Fall Festival on September 24. The festival includes live entertainment, a cruise-in, local vendors and children's activities. Throughout autumn, enjoy live music, weekly markets and drive-in movies. Check out our calendar for more information on upcoming events.

Attend West Virginia's Largest Single-**Day Festival**

Appreciate the peak fall view from the New River Gorge Bridge and watch as professionals BASE jump and rappel from the structure at one of the largest extreme sports events in the world. That's right, save the date for Bridge Day on October 21, 2023. Bridge Day is the only day of the year that pedestrians are allowed on the renowned New River Gorge Bridge. The iconic structure is the longest single-arch bridge in the Western Hemisphere.

In addition to watching thrilling BASE jumping and rappelling, there are other events during the popular weekend, including the Bridge Day Chili Cook-Off, Taste of Bridge Day, Active Southern West Virginia's Bridge Day 5k Run and more. 
















How One Ohio Cemetery Continues to *Inspire the Living*



Lake View Cemetery in Cleveland, Ohio, has been drawing visitors and residents for over one hundred and fifty years. This 285-acre resting place is home to Presidents, dignitaries, and local members of the community. But it is more than a final resting place for the deceased. It is a resting place for the living.

In the mid-1850s, church graveyards were increasingly getting overcrowded, and many urban areas struggled with crowded unkept conditions for the deceased. Additionally, there needed to be more opportunity for the cemeteries to expand due to increased demand for land and subsequent rising costs. Many soon realized the need for space beyond the confines of the city.

The gently rolling hills and forested valleys drew developers to the land now known as Lake View Cemetery. Modeled after elaborate English gardens, Lake View was designed as a garden cemetery and is one of the largest in the United States.

Paying homage to nature, the roadways, monuments, statues,

and landscaping were designed to create a tranquil yet vibrant cemetery while honoring those who have passed. Carefully crafted gardens of trees, shrubbery, and flowers highlight the already natural beauty of the land and additionally serve educational purposes.

Upon entering the majestic gates of the cemetery, you will be surprised by the life encountered here. Tour the grounds by trolley or with naturalists as you discover the wild side of things around here. On

concert days, music lifts from the treetops. Other days are reflective, and you may encounter a guided meditation. Enjoy a twilight tour or take a walk in the winter garden.

It is also a place of peace and tranquility. Sculptures silently tell stories of heartbreak intermingled with joy. Reflections on Wade

Pond calm our souls while a jukebox fashioned out of a headstone for Alan Freed brings smiles as we fondly reflect on the impact the lives of those buried here have had on our lives.

The gardens live and breathe throughout each season with their beauty. Spring sun brings the daffodil hill to life, giving way to summer blossoms before bowing to the rich autumn hues of the majestic maples and oaks. The winter landscape glistens under the frost creating a monochromatic backdrop for exquisite art and architecture.

The Wade Memorial Chapel's stained-glass shimmers with opulence and depth at any time of the year. Designed by Fredrick Wilson and constructed by Tiffany, the window, known as the *Flight of the Souls*, remains a testament to the artistry and beauty of his work. A mosaic on the Chapel wall symbolizes the law of the Old Testament, and the east wall depicts the fulfillment of the laws of the prophets through the

birth of Christianity.

The cemetery is a nonprofit and is the final resting place for dignitaries and average citizens. Founders never intended to be selective but rather inclusive. President Garfield and John D Rockefeller are memorialized here, along with Elliot Ness and Alan Freed. Lake View has no religious affiliation or ethnicity and welcomes all who come here.

Lake View's carefully



While the fully immersive haunts may not be for everyone, there are varying levels of immersion within Terror Town; color coded wristbands will determine which level of hell you'll venture through as you follow the trail through town. If you're in need of a break from the horror, or if you're a wimp when it comes to all things scary like me, there will be saloons and stores available to rest your weary souls. 
The National Road and Zane Grey Museum contains exhibits highlighting important pieces of the area's history. The National Road exhibit--America's first



Sitting just thirty miles outside of Columbus lies Circleville, Ohio. Lindsey's Bakery makes the "world's largest pumpkin pie" annually. The pie requires over one hundred pounds of pumpkin,


twenty-six gallons of milk, and fifteen dozen eggs. The pie pan was so big it had to be moved to a tent in the street.






