TOTALITY AWESOME

SANDUSKY COUNTY TOTAL SOLAR ECLIPSE 4-8-2024

Nature's rarest celestial wonder. You owe it to yourself to experience it once in your lifetime.

Total solar eclipses are indeed rare and awe-inspiring events. It's fascinating to know that the last total solar eclipse visible in Ohio was in 1806, and the next one after April will be in 2099. This long gap between total solar eclipses makes each occurrence a special and unique experience for those who get to witness it. Only 21 total solar eclipses have crossed the lower 48 states in the entire existence of the United States.

On April 8, 2024 "totality" as it is referred to, will enter Ohio around 3:00 p.m. in the southwest corner of the state and will exit the northeast corner around 3:10 p.m. During that time, those in the path of the total solar eclipse will be cast into darkness. All of Sandusky County will be in the area of totality. Sandusky County will experience 3 minutes 38 seconds of darkness while central and southeast Ohio will experience only seconds of totality or no totality at all. Make the most of a once-in-a-lifetime event and make the drive to Sandusky County.

Make it a long weekend, with many eclipse themed events, featuring live music, food and more. You will return home with nothing but memories of good times and nature's greatest celestial gift.



The 1.5-mile loop will take you along some of the most beautiful parts of the Cuyahoga Valley National Park (CVNP), the ninth most visited national park in the United States in 2022.

Start the trail by enjoying some of the freshly preserved grounds that surround Brandywine Falls, a 65-foot waterfall that will leave you speechless. The trail will lead you to an easily accessible boardwalk that takes you directly to the waterfall. The view of the waterfall from the boardwalk is something out of a movie. Take a solo stroll or bring family and friends to see this popular trail and sight in the CVNP.

The sights will have you coming back time and time again. The different seasons will provide you with various experiences of the Falls. Spring offers vernal pools along with prime bloom season and summer comes with sunset views and beautiful weather. The fall is filled with color-changing leaves and the winter brings a winter wonderland giving the waterfall a whole new look! No matter what time of year you visit the trail, there are beautiful sights to see each time to make the same trail feel like a brand new one.

After taking in the stunning view of the Falls, head back up onto the trail. The loop will offer you a look at some of the indigenous nature inside of the Cuyahoga Valley National Park. It will then take you back to the beginning of the trail exactly where you started. You'll leave with memories that you can never forget! A Cycling Paradise in Knox County Connects Communities and Nature

Discover the thrill of pedaling through Knox County's Cycling Paradise, where a 35-mile expanse of paved trails offers more than just a path for cycling; it's a vibrant journey connecting the quaint villages and the lively downtown of Mount Vernon. This network, featuring the Kokosing Gap Trail, Heart of Ohio Trail, and Mohican Valley Trail, is not just a route but a gateway to adventure and community connections.

Centrally located along the Ohio to Erie Trail, Knox County is an essential link in the 326-mile pathway bridging the Ohio River and Lake Erie. Every year, the Knox County trails host the exciting 'Trailapalooza,' a celebration of cycling and the great outdoors starting in 2022. Returning in Fall 2024, this event invites visitors to immerse themselves in the vibrant activities and amenities of the trail towns.

Along the trails, cyclists can discover attractions enriching the riding experience. Ariel-Foundation Park, Mid-Way Welcome Station of the Ohio to Erie Trail in Centerburg, and South Main Plaza Dog Fountain in Mount Vernon are among these notable stops. Access to the scenic Kokosing and Mohican State Rivers provides a pleasant diversion for those who love the water.

Cyclists eager for a souvenir can pick up a free "Bike Knox Ohio" sticker at the historic CA&C Visitor Center in Mount Vernon, symbolizing their journey through this cycling haven. The Y-Not Bike Shop on the Kokosing Gap Trail in Mount Vernon is a must-visit for anyone with biking needs and cycling enthusiasts.

Other highlights along the trail include the Brown Family Environmental Center, Kenyon College, a historic locomotive and caboose, and the picturesque Bridge of Dreams in Brinkhaven. Each spot offers its unique charm, contributing to the trail's allure.

The trails of Knox County offer far more than mere cycling paths; they stand as a must-visit destination, beautifully merging nature's beauty, cultural depth, and recreational enjoyment. These routes traverse the countryside and serve as gateways to unexpected adventures and meaningful connections with local communities. Milestone birthdays are profoundly significant as they give us an opportunity to investigate the past and learn more about ourselves and what makes us special. 60 years is a journey, and it all started on March 29, 1964, when the Center of Science and Industry or COSI (pronounced CO-Sigh), opened its doors to an overwhelmingly large crowd, excited to see what Columbus, Ohio's newest cultural institution had in store.

For 60 years, COSI has inspired interest in science, technology, engineering, math, and art (STEAM) topics while delivering a fun, experiential, "hands-on" brand of learning. 60 years also comes with a lot of recent accolades for the science museum in 2023, including being



voted the "#1 Science Museum in the Country," according to USA Today's 10Best and a winner and recipient of the National Medal for Museum and Library Services - the highest honor given by The White House each year. COSI has also been awarded multiple Emmy® Awards for "Dr. B in 3," an animated video series in which "Dr. B," COSI's President and CEO, Dr. Frederic Bertley, leads viewers through challenging scientific topics with clarity and wit.

A big birthday comes with a big exhibition hosted in 2024. Titanic: The Artifact Exhibition is open now at COSI and runs through Labor Day. Guests visiting will receive a replica boarding pass and experience the wonder and tragedy of the world's most famous ocean liner, *Titanic*. More than 350 artifacts recovered from the ship's wreck site will be on display as well as full-scale room recreations, including the iconic Grand Staircase. The personal artifacts recovered and on display offer an emotional connection to the forever-altered lives of those on board.

An event lineup fit for a milestone birthday is in progress as well! After their big birthday celebration on March 29, the entire COSI team gears up for the largest STEAM event in the Midwest, The COSI Science Festival. With three days of community science events May 1 - 3 ranging from the science of glassblowing to documenting real scientific data throughout the community for researchers, the Big Science Celebration caps the event off on Saturday, May 4, at COSI with over 100 exhibitors, live music and performances, and of course, HUGE, larger-than-life science demonstrations during the day. Throughout the year, COSI also hosts events exclusively for those 21 and older called COSI After Dark. These event days are always themed to pop

culture and big events. For example, in May, the "Empire Strikes Bash" will delight visitors, highlighting a night of fun around a large, cultural franchise, and in June, COSI will host "Prom" after a wildly successful COSI After Dark event in 2023.

COSI is also featuring The Science of Big Machines in June. More than just a touch-a-truck type event, this event allows guests to get inside and operate large construction equipment, talk with engineers and construction professionals, and enjoy learning about something that affects everyone daily. In August, Farm Days is an experience where guests can learn about farming, animals, and agriculture. Experts are brought in along with real animals and farming equipment to enhance the learning element of the event. A fan-favorite of Farm Days is the baby chick incubation area. Eggs hatch before visitors' eyes as they witness the miraculous process of birth for these baby birds. In September, Blast, COSI's signature fundraiser, allows COSI's biggest supporters to dance the night away while enjoying culinary delights, live music, and science demonstrations.

Amazing, classic COSI exhibits are available to guests in all seasons. Some of the most popular are Ocean, which has multiple water features, a large, beautiful statue of the ocean god, Poseidon, an interactive, digital fish tank, games to research deep-dive submersibles, live animals and more. Other notable exhibitions include Gadgets, which features hands-on activities and experiments with simple machines of all shapes and sizes, Progress, featuring the same town both in 1898 and 1964 with recognizable updates to their progress throughout the years, and the American Museum of Natural History Dinosaur Gallery, which has real fossils and shows guests how modern-day birds are descended from dinosaurs from the past.

A birthday celebration of this magnitude doesn't happen often, and COSI is celebrating all-year-long! For more information and to purchase tickets, please visit COSI.org.



Find Waterfall Wonders in the Allegheny National Forest

Step into the lush Allegheny National Forest in Pennsylvania and let Bent Run and Hector Run Waterfalls wow you. These falls promise exhilarating and unforgettable adventures for the passionate nature enthusiast and the thrill-seeking explorer.

Experience the stunning beauty of Bent Run Waterfall, a breathtaking cascade along Rt. 59 in the Allegheny National Forest. It becomes a powerful spectacle in the lively spring months, swelling with the spring rains and runoff. It becomes a gentle trickle during the dry summers, offering a more subtle experience. This waterfall is easy to reach and provides a short, enjoyable hike that blends peaceful nature with a touch of adventure.

Surround yourself with the magical surroundings of Hector Run Falls, a fantastic waterfall set in a remarkable natural area. It may only be 22 feet tall, but it is imposing, with big trees and huge rocks. The water falls over a rock wall shaped like a rectangle, making it feel like a place from long ago. To see something special, go in the spring, fall, or winter when the waterfall has two separate flows, which differs from the gentler stream you see in the summer.


The journey to Hector Run Falls is an adventure in itself. Your expedition begins on a dirt road in Ludlow, Pennsylvania. It's approximately a two-mile hike on some

rugged terrain, but it's an experience that will etch itself in your memory. Be sure to use GPS coordinates 41.6853,- [number_1] to navigate your way, and let the Hector Run stream guide you directly to the waterfall.

Visiting these waterfalls in Allegheny National Forest is more than a quick trip. It's about the whole experience - the journey, the nature sounds, the fantastic views, and all the memories you'll make. If you're looking for something more than just a typical visit, these falls offer a chance to experience nature's incredible beauty.

Featuring more than 40,000 acres of land designated by the Ohio Department of Natural resources, including miles upon miles of breathtaking trails, a relaxing recreational river, a sprawling state park and even skyscraping ziplines, Warren County has quietly become one of the Buckeye State's most popular stops for fresh-air fun.

So where exactly should you head for outdoorsy excitement in Ohio's Largest Playground? There's truly no wrong place to start.

If there's a paddler in your party, you won't want to miss the Little Miami. Winding its way through miles of serene, midwestern wilderness, Warren County's Little Miami Scenic River ranks among the region's most beautiful and easily accessible recreational waterways. Those into high-flying fun can find even more of it at Gentle Breeze, a locally owned and operated hot air balloon outfitter that has spent nearly 40 years helping Warren County visitors check off their bucket lists.

Looking for something a little more low-key? Consider Caesar Creek - one of the Buckeye State's most gorgeous State Parks. Once covered by vast seas and later by glaciers, the park is now home to beautifully preserved hiking and horseback trails, carefully crafted





center and even some of the region's richest fossil hunting territory.

Speaking of hunting, adventurous Warren County visitors can also embark on the all-new Ohio's Largest Playground GeoTour - a 15-site, scavenger hunt game which sends players scrambling all throughout the county.

If you're the outdoorsy type, but also have a knack for history, don't leave town without experiencing Fort Ancient. Home to hiking trails and scenic overlooks, plus more than 2,000 years of incredible American Indian history, the awe-inspiring

McWane River Walk

This new multi-use path includes portions of city blocks and runs along the scenic areas nestled near the Muskingum and Tuscarawas rivers. The river walk begins at the west end of Main Street behind Coshocton Village Inn and Suites, goes under the SR 541 bridge and passes Skip's Landing, which is home to the Coshocton Farmer's Market from May through October. It weaves along the rivers where it joins the Lake Park Connector path, which offers passage under SR 36 for safe access to Lake Park, Eagle Ridge Disc Golf Course, and Historic Roscoe Village. The path will also connect to the proposed County Road 621 multi-use path scheduled for completion in 2025. The McWane River Walk is made possible by a generous donation from McWane Ductile.

American, Bridal Veil and a portion of the Horseshoe Falls are located in Niagara Falls, New York, USA. The larger part of the Horseshoe Falls is located in Niagara Falls, Ontario, Canada. Open year-round, the area offers 24 hours a day, 7 days a week access to amazing views.

The water flowing over the Falls comes from four of the Great Lakes--Erie, Huron, Michigan and Superior. On our trip, we visited both sides of the Falls and can tell you that there are many things to do and see on both sides.

An up close and personal (and very wet) view of the Falls is an unforgettable experience from the Niagara City Cruises boat. Prior to boarding, you are given a waterproof poncho. The boat travels up the Niagara River, passing the American and Bridal Veil Falls before coming so close to the Horseshoe Falls that you will likely be soaked by the torrential mist. The deafening roar in that area explains the name Niagara, believed to be the native origin of "thundering waters." Boats can be boarded from either the United States or Canadian sides of the river.





The Falls are illuminated nightly, year-round, although the time schedule changes monthly depending on what time it turns dark in the area. Although random colors are usually used, the Niagara Falls Illumination Board does honor requests to use special color combinations for charitable and not-forprofit organizations to light the Falls. From the middle of May to early October there is a fireworks display each night at 10 pm which can be seen from anywhere in the vicinity.

We saw an amazing view of the Horseshoe Falls while enjoying lunch at the Table Rock House Restaurant. Anywhere along the Niagara Parkway you are able to see all of the Falls and take amazing photos. Closer to the Horseshoe Falls, you may be treated to a mist shower, depending on which direction the wind is blowing that day.

Located behind the Table Rock Centre is the Falls Incline Railway. This Railway allows pedestrians a quick, easy way to go from the many hotels located on Fallsview Blvd. at the top of the hill to the Horseshoe Falls area below. Tickets are available for one-way, two-way, or all-day use and we rode it every day during our stay.

The Journey Behind the Falls entrance is located at Table Rock Centre. This adventure starts with an elevator ride down 125 feet, after which you will explore tunnels while feeling the vibration of the falls over your head. At the end of one tunnel, an opening allows you to take a photo from behind the Horseshoe Falls while thousands of gallons of water flow over it. Another tunnel ends in a viewing area where you will be at the bottom of the falls looking up at the water, making for another unforgettable photo opportunity. This adventure also requires a waterproof poncho, as you will get wet.

As you walk down the Niagara Parkway through the Central Niagara Parks, you

will see beautiful flower displays and manicured bushes, with numerous park benches for a break to rest and enjoy the view. WildPlay Zipline to the Falls offers four riders at a time a view of all three Falls, landing at the base of the Horseshoe Falls.

Clifton Hill has been transformed into a family-friendly area with the Niagara Skywheel, Movieland Wax Museum, Dinosaur Adventure Golf, the Cosmic Coaster, and numerous restaurants and snack areas. You can spend a full day in this area enjoying the attractions. The Fallsview Indoor Waterpark has water activities for all ages and is a year-round attraction.

A major highlight of our trip was dinner at the Skylon Tower revolving dining room. Since the room completes one revolution per hour and our reservation was for 7 pm, we were able to see all of the Falls in both daylight and illuminated. There are numerous choices on the menu. We selected different entrees, as well as a shared desert. After dinner, we walked up to the observation deck, for more beautiful views of the illuminated Falls. Although you can ride a "yellow

bug" elevator to the observation level for a separate charge, dining includes that experience.

During our stay, we parked our vehicle at the hotel and walked everywhere we went. After checking out of the hotel, we drove down the Niagara Parkway to the see the Whirlpool Aero Car. This cable car, suspended above the Niagara Gorge, gives riders an unforgettable view of the Niagara Whirlpool below. We continued down the Parkway to the Floral Clock, which contains over 20,000 small plants on the face that are changed twice each year.


In New York, we spent a day at Niagara Falls State Park, which is the oldest state park in the United States. Although there is no charge to enter the park, there is a charge for parking. Beautifully landscaped, this 400-acre park allows you to walk alongside the American rapids above the Falls. You can visit the wooden walkways of the Cave of the Winds and stand on Hurricane Deck below the Bridal Veil Falls. Be prepared to utilize another poncho as you will get soaked at that vantage point.

We had lunch at the Top of the Falls restaurant which offers yet another amazing view of the rapids and the American Falls. Numerous walking paths and observation areas throughout the Park offer different views of all three Falls, as well as a possible mist shower. You can easily spend an entire day exploring the area. Snack bars in the area offer picnic tables for a quick bite or an afternoon ice cream treat to cool off on a hot day.









In the eyes of the world, Ohio is the birthplace of aviation, the home of Neil Armstrong and the mother of U.S. Presidents. And that vision is expanding to include Ohio's incredible monumental earthworks built by ancient Native Americans well over a thousand years ago.

On September 19, the 21 countries on the UNESCO World Heritage Committee, a branch of the United Nations, issued their decision to inscribe the Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks as the United States' 25th addition to the World Heritage List and the first in

the state of Ohio. This list is made up of cultural and natural sites across the world that are deemed to be of "outstanding universal value" which are important across generations. Other examples of World Heritage sites include Stonehenge, Yellowstone National Park, Machu Picchu and the Taj Mahal.

The Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks, which include five locations managed by the National Park Service and three managed by the Ohio History Connection, were built by Native Americans between 1,600 and 2,000 years ago. They are complex masterpieces of landscape

architecture and are exceptional among ancient monuments worldwide in their enormous scale, geometric precision and astronomical alignments. The Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks sites, located in Licking, Ross and Warren counties, are about eight sites telling a single story.

The National Park Service's Hopewell Culture National Historical Park in Chillicothe includes the Mound City Group, the largest concentration of burial mounds attributed to the Hopewell Culture, Hopewell Mound Group, the largest of the enclosures and contains a perfect square, Seip Earthworks,

Ancient Earthworks & Nature Preserve, a three-and-a-half-mile expanse of walls that surround a blufftop, is in Oregonia.

The Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks were nominated to the **UNESCO** World Heritage List in January 2022 by the U.S. Department of the Interior, but the process to get to that point started back as early as the 90s with thousands of people helping along the way. Many Tribal Partners passed resolutions in support of the World Heritage project, including the Eastern Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, Shawnee Tribe, Miami Tribe, Wyandotte Nation, Seneca-Cayuga Tribe, Quapaw Tribe, Peoria Tribe, Ottawa Tribe, Pokagon Band of Potawatomi, and the Seneca Nation of Indians.

These tribes helped provide support, context and feedback to help shape the experience that visitors will see at these sites. None of this is clearer than in the logo design.

The logo is representative of the earthworks themselves on many levels. The graded arches symbolize the earthworks both above and below the ground. The moon rises above them,

representing the many lunar alignments found in the earthworks and the rhythm of nature that has been written in the land. Water features run along the base of the earthworks just as they once did, thousands of years ago. Purple was chosen for the sky to symbolize a wise, revered and maternal presence. Lastly, the typography mimics the circular nature of the icon; a nod to the shapes of many of the earthworks and their amazingly precise geometry.


When visitors come, they most likely will not know the effort that went into creating this experience and protecting these sacred sites. The hope, instead, is that whether they visit for a day, two days or more, they will view these works as outstanding human genius that need to be seen in person and protected for generations to come. Feel a connection to our past and gain a wider understanding of what it means to be human. When you visit a Hopewell Ceremonial Earthwork site, you will be a witness to ancient brilliance.



birding and fishing opportunities, a disc golf course, picnic shelters and play area, as well as a floating bridge. Yes, we said floating bridge.







Darke County, Ohio, is a living monument to its illustrious daughter, Annie Oakley. The Annie Oakley Trail offers a chance to follow in her footsteps. 
with confidence and grace. Her legal battles to protect her reputation further exemplify her unyielding spirit and commitment to integrity.

SR 127 Barn Mural north on SR 127 reveals a painted barn mural of Annie Oakley, a nod to her nickname "Little Sure Shot," given by Chief Sitting Bull. North Star Roadside Marker indicates the location of Oakley's childhood home. Yorkshire Gravesite, is the resting place of Oakley's parents and siblings. Spencer Road Birthplace Marker located in Willowdell denotes Oakley's birthplace, adding to the trail's historical richness. Brock Cemetery is home to Annie

Oakley's final resting place, where she was buried on the same day as her husband, who passed away 18 days after Annie. The Annie Oakley Trail in Darke

County is a celebration of a remarkable woman's life, defying the odds and leaving a lasting impact on American history and culture. Each location provides unique insights into Oakley's life and the county's influence on her. Spring has sprung in Shores & Islands Ohio and we couldn't be more excited to get out and explore part of what makes this area special - the great outdoors. You're even beginning to see some flowers in bloom, from crocus and snowdrops, to tulips and daffodils. Spring bloom certainly is a great opportunity to enjoy the acres of beautiful gardens available throughout the region. Searching for signs of spring in these natural treasures is a perfect early-spring activity. Here are the top six Shores & Islands Ohio area flower gardens.

Schedel Arboretum & Gardens, Elmore

The 17-acre Schedel Arboretum & Gardens is a hidden treasure located just off the Ohio Turnpike (180/90 Exit 81) in Elmore. The gardens include a Japanese garden, a kitchen garden filled with ornamental peppers, a bonsai collection, water gardens, perennial gardens, and gardens with nearly 10,000 flowering annuals. The expansive property also features sculpture, a visitor center offering snacks and beverages that can be enjoyed overlooking the gardens, an event space, and the Blair Museum of Lithophanes in the manor house. Schedel hosts many special events and workshops throughout the year and is a popular venue for outdoor weddings. The gardens are open for self-guided tours in April and daily through October. There is an admission fee to visit.

Schoepfle Garden, Birmingham

Located in the small village of Birmingham, just south of Vermilion along the Vermilion River, Schoepfle Gardens is a 70-acre arboretum featuring 20 acres of topiaries, rose gardens, and perennial and annual flowers with miles of paved pathways. A children's garden inspired by music features a working carousel and guided group tram tours through the property are available. Trails along the river are adjacent to the arboretum. These gardens are a popular spot for photographers.

James H. McBride Arboretum, Huron

Located adjacent to BGSU Firelands, James H. McBride Arboretum features over 50 acres of gardens, plants, and flowering crabapple trees with accessible walking trails. The arboretum is open year-round and offers picnic tables as well as public restrooms for guests. This beautiful park is especially popular for weddings and special occasion photos.

Ohio's Most Beautiful Mile, Lakeside

Dubbed "Ohio's Most Beautiful Mile," this lakeside walking trail stretches from Oak Avenue on the western edge of the community of Lakeside to Perry Park. Multi-season perennial gardens with native plants are planted along the entire lakefront path. Walkers will pass by the historic Hotel Lakeside, the Lakeside dock, Bettinger Park with its Steele Memorial Gazebo, and more along the way. In spring, guests can experience the blooming daffodils along the water's edge. Visitors to Lakeside might also enjoy the Memorial

Garden at nearby Chautauqua Park. If you time it right, you may be able to catch a glimpse of the rare Lakeside Daisy (see sidebar). During the Lakeside Chautauqua season, a gate fee is charged to visit the community and guided garden tours are often offered as part of the programming.

Washington Park, Sandusky

Sandusky's Washington Park is beautifully maintained by an amazing group of city employees, assisted by dedicated volunteers and civic sponsors, who generate over 100,000 plants each year in the city's greenhouse. Visit floral mounds sponsored by local businesses and organizations, as well as a working floral clock, a sunken Japanese garden, and the Boy with the Boot fountain. During the summer season the park hosts concerts in its gazebo and is home to many events, such as the annual 4th of July celebration and the weekly Farmer's Market.

Jane Coates Wildflower Trail, Put-in-Bay

While not a manicured garden, the Jane Coates Wildflower Trail is a half-mile loop through a particularly beautiful wooded area filled with many varieties of wildflowers. In the spring, visitors enjoy Dutchman's Breeches, Jack in the Pulpit, and Blue Phlox, according to the Lake Erie Islands Conservancy. Jane Coates was a former island artist who was known for her love of the island's wild areas. This trail is also a great spot for birdwatching.

The Lakeside Daisy

Visit the Shores & Islands Ohio region from early to mid-May when the endangered Lakeside Daisy is in bloom! It grows on the Marblehead Peninsula at the 136-acre Lakeside Daisy State Nature Preserve and is one of the only natural U.S. populations of this wildflower. Lakeside Daisies grow in alvar, a type of limestone where very little else can grow, and this small-but-mighty flower can also be spotted locally within Lakeside Chautauqua and along the East Quarry Trail on Kelleys Island (viewable from an overlook at the Glacial Grooves Geological Preserve).


